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PPSD EQUITY CONFERENCE APRIL 5 &6

Over 250 educators, parents, students and community members attended the first annual PPSD Equity Conference, RISE UP! Carving a Path for Educational Equity and Justice (CPEEJ), which was hosted by the Office of Equity and Belonging, on April 5th and 6th, at PCTA. The overarching purpose of the CPEEJ Conference was to: (1) provide participants with a foundational understanding of educational equity and justice, (2) spark discussion and reflection about the role that we can each play in championing educational equity and justice for Providence students, (3) ignite a personal and/or collective commitment to take action, (4) and to understand how in doing so, we can individually and collectively bring excellence, value, high expectations with support, to our students, families, schools, and community. Student and adult presenters, from Providence and as far away as Atlanta, facilitated twenty-four workshops focused on the five components of the PPSD Equity Framework—Student Support and Empowerment, Culturally Responsive Education, Family and Community Agency, Accountability & Transparency, and Climate, Culture and Belonging. Participants were treated to opening remarks from Dr. Javier Montanez, Dr. Nkolika Onye, and Maribeth Calabro. Keynote speakers-Marcela Bettancur, Dr. Mark Gooden, Jason Craige Harris, and Dr. Folami Prescott-Adams, provided important links to the overall purpose and vision for the conference. The conference culminated with a panel discussion facilitated by Treda Collier-Dickenman that included keynote speakers, presenters, and members of the Office of Equity and Belonging, including Aarav Sunadaresh. All participants were able to select up to 4 brand new books representative of a wide variety of equity related topics, written by a variety of known and relatively new authors. On May 30, 2024, from 9:15 to 11:00 AM, students will showcase their equity action projects at the CIC Building located at 255 Dyer St. Providence. The showcase takes place during the third, and final, **R.E.S.P.E.C.T. Student Equity Leadership Conference** of the 202324 school year, organized by the Office of Equity and Belonging. Launched in Fall 2022, the goal of R.E.S.P.E.C.T. programming is to inspire young people to be the change they seek by learning how to strategize, problem-solve, engage in critical analysis, write for purpose, and work with their peers to make the change needed to improve their school and local community. During the R.E.S.P.E.C.T. conference series, students from every middle and high school, and one elementary school, gather to; (1) identify issues that impede their access to educational excellence, (2) gather and analyze data, (3) create and execute their action plans. The public showcase on May 30, is new this year. Eighty-five young people will be ready to share the projects they have sustained all year. Please join us. Student Equity Summer Leadership Academy (SESLA)

SESLA is a FREE 9-Day equity leadership institute for R.E.S.P.E.C.T. student leaders. It is designed to bolster students' critical thinking, leadership, advocacy, literacy and public speaking skills. Through guided programming, SESLA equips young leaders with the tools and knowledge necessary to create impactful change in their communities. This Academy will take place from August 13, 2024 through August 23, 2024 at the Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs at Brown University. It is open to up to 40 **RESPECT students.** Permission slips were distributed to schools by the of week (4/19) and will be accepted on a first come basis. The Academy is free and transportation will be provided. Each participant with at least 90% attendance, will receive a small stipend at the end of the Academy.
