Early Modern to Modern

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a survey course of the history of the world from the end of the Middle Ages to the Modern Era. In General. students will investigate the formation of modern governments, their interactions, and topics such as genocide and global human rights. Students will understand the origins of major current events and better understand their place in our world. More specifically, Students will move through this course through exploration of 7 thematic topics: Medieval and Renaissance Europe, Medieval Asia, Africa and South America, and European Colonization of the Americas. This will be followed by the Age of Enlightenment and American and French Revolutions. These topics will be followed by the Era of Imperialism, Industrialization and urbanization. Finally, students will study Global Wars - WWI, WWII, including specifics of the Holocaust, and Cold War. The course culminates with the topic of Decolonization and Globalization, including ideas behind both the support and opposition to Communism and will end with New Globalism and the Technological Age. In this course document, you will find District Scope and Sequence details, starting with suggested pacing guide (below) and is followed by a description of the new PPSD Social Studies framework and its instructional strategies. This document also contains embedded links with model lessons that align to the new framework and most recent district initiatives.
